


Individual Verbatim Responses by Question

- The disintegration of Camp Creek drainage (the ditch)







Meeting Logistics (16 responses)


- Two more “moveable” microphones to pass around to meeting participants




Design (37 responses)

General

- Get help from Glen Eyrie personnel – their project is very nice
- Have Christo design an art project over the 31st Street drainage and use the money generated to pay for the real improvements
- More mitigation and diversion of water around Queen’s Canyon and ponds to divert
- From a hydrology point of view, it would be of interest to know which criteria will drive technical design: flow volume? Flow rate? Volume flow cross-section? Channel contact surface (friction component in controlling flow rate)?

- What model studies have been researched in areas outside of the Pikes Peak area that have similar challenges, i.e. California mudslides or in places like Venice or Amsterdam in Europe?
- Doesn't seem to be many comments about mitigation efforts upstream before flows reach the inhabitable areas – probably because those areas are not seen by most of the public; the functional design should also include them
- Take another look at the 4600 ft. / sec. vs. 280 ft³ / sec; something's wrong. In the August rain storm, the ditch reached a 40% capacity – or 3 feet high at the 31st and Fontanero intersection
- One of the presenters mentioned designing for the smaller of the water estimates. I think we need to keep in mind that climate estimate indicates that weather is going to get more extreme. Larger/more intense rainfalls. We should definitely keep in mind that this last flood may be the new norm! Please plan ahead so we don't have to do this again in 20 years
- Consider using and further developing the existing valley reservoir site. Install an inlet and outlet to better serve as a holding pond. If done correctly, an integrated valley reservoir could also add another aesthetic asset to Garden of the Gods
- Want a multi-use solution that includes flood control, trails, wildlife habitat and attractive natural feel
- Do not over-design Camp Creek
- 3 HEC II modeling is needed before any design solutions are considered
- Make it functional
- Area adjacent to Glen Eyrie could be made into holding pond – where all the gravel washed in recently
- Slow the flow!
- Consider more mitigation farther upstream (northwest of Glen Eyrie)
- Take a long ball perspective... 2-3 phases → 10 years functional → come back after 10 years and beautify it.
- Unless you know the new '4600' answer, you do not have an objective to plan for
- Is there any plan to work with the Forest Service to take down standing dead upstream to help prevent blockage? In the Hayman burn scar, there is still a huge number of trees that are standing dead; that is 10 years later
- Viable plan

31st Street Channel Design

- The simplest fix is to replace the culverts on 31st Street with bridges that permit full flow
- 31st: the ideal solution is to naturalize the whole streambed, making it wider, with shrubs and trees – including improvement of the underground section from Echo to Fountain Creek
- Hoping that we can design something functional but still an asset to the community. I have always called the Creek “the ditch”. I’d like to have some reason to change the nomenclature
- Covering the ditch is not an option we would approve!
- Make 31st Street meander along Creek drainage – will slow water and traffic flow
- Do not cover (put a top over) Camp Creek on 31st Street
- Cover Creek in front of Howbert to help with parking
- To insure flow out of Rock Ledge Ranch stays in existing channel. Make sure water does not flow through Pleasant Valley but stays in 31st Street ditch. Sediment holding ponds. Debris racks
- It seems to me the only way to increase the water flow capacity of the “ditch” is to make it deeper and wider. There is no room to make it wider unless houses are removed along one side of 31st Street. Increasing flow capacity increase flow rate
- I am opposed to any 5 ft. fence. I think it would create far more problems than solutions
- Seems removing parking strips and doubling size of ditch one of the few options

Garden of the Gods/Rock Ledge Ranch Design

- We would also like to see changes in the elevation of Gateway Road to create a berm and slow the flow of water downstream

- I recommend that we bury the channel at the end of 31st Street, create the connecting path from Garden of the Gods Park to it, make a green trail with trees and benches and a path in the middle of 31st to Fountain Creek trail. Forget the Ridge Road trail. It's too steep and dangerous
- Also, consider dams above Rock Ledge Ranch for holding water; they would be a beautiful addition to Garden of the Gods
- Focus first on the narrow, curvy drainage bottlenecks at Rock Ledge Ranch at Chambers and 31st Street

Traffic/Streets/Bridges (25 responses)

Access

- Make another emergency exit from Pleasant Valley
- Any plans for an exit for residents that doesn't cross Camp Creek?
- An exit to the west would be nice
- Need additional street access out, but not to north end 31st. Need other than 31st
- Increase easements on west side of 31st for escaping in an emergency
- When planning, provide access (better) on each side of the ditch. I don't know folks across the ditch
- EGRESS
- It would be fantastic if Pleasant Valley residents were not cut off by police from their homes during big rains or due to impending construction
- In the meantime [before drainage improvements], have organized, planned neighborhood evacuation exercises. Where does everyone need to go?

Bridges

- Our bridges need to be improved upon
- Also, preserve the pedestrian bridges. Many people in Pleasant Valley walk – strollers, school children, dog walkers
- It is also important to us to have safe access out of the neighborhood in event of flooding, which would come from improving bridges
- One bridge with higher clearance to still access Pleasant Valley when flooding or high flows
- Make sure we have a functional (reworked) bridge

Streets

- No roundabouts!
- No widening of 31st – and we need on-street parking on 31st south of Fontanero
- Preserve, if possible, bike lanes or some sort of bike lanes
- No traffic circles
- Bike trail is huge on this road. We need to maintain a safe walking / biking trail

- It is imperative that the parking lanes be maintained and the street not widened or extended.
- I like the idea of a notched bike path along the Creek
- Please do not add guard rails along ditch
- No guardrails!
- No roundabouts at Fontanero/31st Street
- Street lower on west side; raise it

Traffic

- It can be very difficult to turn right from Valley or Echo onto southbound 31st Street. Cars travel too fast on 31st, especially southbound. Sometimes cars drive INTO the ditch and not just when roads are icy! Speeding is also a problem on Valley, Echo, and Fontmore, especially on the west side of 31st. Rockrimmon has speed bumps. Why none in P.V.?
- The amount of traffic on 31st is much bigger than simply neighborhood traffic – largely I-25 to Highway 24 cut-through traffic. How much easier would it be if traffic loads were smaller? Where else / how else could traffic move?
- Large volume of traffic on 31st Street south of Fontanero needs to be addressed as part of this project
- Do not increase traffic on 31st Street. Provide access to part (?) of the valley west of 31st Street
- I'm very concerned that a storm water solution will be tied to a perceived need for a west side north / south artery. This would cleave the neighborhood, decrease safety, and ruin this potential amenity

Community Process (12 responses)

- Thank you for arranging and facilitating the meeting!
- Keep it short and concise
- Good discussion sessions
- Great group discussion
- We hope the neighborhood will be kept well-informed
- Need some longer time frames for group discussions
- Homeowners on 31st should be a group at the table
- Informative staff of instructors; thank you
- Would like to see residents living on 31st Street to have more input
- Would like to know who was interviewed to compile Preliminary Issues List. Neighborhood families were not directly contacted; important to get input from families living on or near 31st Street ditch
- Communication
- Off to a good start

Flooding/Drainage (10 responses)

- Forget about aesthetics: reduce cost of flood insurance
- Project people need to look at the history that was written up in *The Gazette* 15 – 20 years ago. They did a wonderful job of showing the floodplain including all the way to the north. Look it up!
- Do consider the springs under Pleasant Valley. People used to have wells to irrigate their yards. It isn't just surface water!
- What would it take to remove the Pleasant Valley area from a 100-year flood plain designation? Will FEMA and other government agencies review the changes to this area to re-evaluate a flood plain designation?
- Once the project is completed (or during), someone should engage someone at the National Flood Insurance agency and / or FEMA and make sure that the flood plain and risks are re-evaluated based on the improvements so that flood insurance premiums would be reflective of the new risk and thus be more affordable. Residents should be offered assistance in and documentation to support their elevations and actual risk
- What about new developments (Cathedral (Cedar?) Heights) running storm drainage down to Camp Creek at Howbert School?
- Can this new data be used to alleviate flood insurance if flows are over-rated?
- Clarify there is only one stream gauge in Camp Creek, not multiple ones
- What is the relationship between the CH2MHill study and "this project"? It seems to ignore the area
- A Pleasant Valley resident asked about re-zoning possibilities for the flood plain. When can we anticipate this to be complete? How (and if) will residents be notified of this? What is the process in regards to FEMA notification on changes? (Timelines?)

Aesthetics (8 responses)

- 31st Street is a gateway to Rock Ledge Ranch and Garden of the Gods. This project is a great opportunity to aesthetically improve the neighborhood and improve property values
- I think aesthetics are important. The basin is a gateway to GoG and Rock Ledge Ranch. This is our chance to beautify the basin and add to the landscape. Add color to the concrete and stamp a design
- It is ugly – make changes so we don't call it a ditch!
- Treat the Camp Creek area as if it is important as a gateway to the mountains. Thousands upon thousands of cars travel from I-25 through Pleasant Valley via 31st Street. This gateway needs to be attractive AND functional
- Although safety and maintenance for property values are important, we must marry aesthetics to increase and improve the neighborhood experience and provide a proper gateway into Garden of the Gods Park
- Aesthetics and beautification is extremely important. We can certainly have a safe drainage area yet still have this be designed so that the increasing number of visitors coming to Garden of the Gods will find this to be an amazing place to visit

- It would be hard to make the 31st channel any uglier
- I would like to see a functional design first along with several architectural designs showing the aesthetic options

Timeline (8 responses)

- Have time frames for completion
- Would like a realistic timeline
- Is there an anticipated date for starting remedial work?
- I would like a better idea of when the construction is going to start
- Let's get it done
- Do it
- This project can't get delayed due to too much "study"; need quick action to critical items with a staged approach
- Timelines

Natural Feel/Environment (5 responses)

- Living on 31st Street for 23 years, we have never seen the Creek level more than ½ full. Since we are directly on 31st, it is very important to us that the Creek be improved in a way that would return it to a more natural state
- Additional issue: Restore natural habitat – make a natural setting to blend urban and wildlife interface and create a corridor for entire community to enjoy – not just Pleasant Valley
- Make Creek accessible for neighbors and wildlife
- Removing elm trees along Creek
- Return to natural rather than concrete

Cultural History/Resources (4 responses)

- Rock Ledge Ranch needs help with cultural history improvements
- Keep historical values
- Our Native American Indian area needs to be moved to higher ground (funding?)
- Do not devote a lot of money to the Native American thing

Funding (4 responses)

- Funding
- Don't just plan, implement (need funding)
- Concerned there won't be enough funding to do the project properly

- I haven't seen any evidence at this point in the project, but am always concerned about strings that come attached to federal funding. What, if any, conditions would we be required to meet for funding this project?

Construction (3 responses)

- Concerned about construction re-routing underground streams that might undermine homes
- During any construction, what happens to the traffic flow?
- Would like to see traffic control suggestions for 31st Street, especially during any reconstruction of the channel, i.e. access to properties adjacent to the channel and emergency ingress and egress

Maintenance (3 responses)

- Any plan must contain a maintenance plan
- Be sure whatever is done can be maintained
- Keep it maintained!

Trails/Recreation (3 responses)

- Very interested in a possibility of a multi-use trail connection from Garden of the Gods to Midland Trail. Would be great to have this connection. Even better would be a dirt connection that could also connect to Red Rocks Open Space and the trail system south of Highway 24. This would be a great asset to both locals as well as tourism. Would be great for hikers, bikers, runners and horses! Would like to see trail issues further addressed in minimizing impact to existing trails, especially in the northern part of Garden of the Gods
- Rock Ledge Ranch needs to be helped with trails and flow
- Would like to maintain and develop a paved bike / hike path through the valley. The gravel path through Rock Ledge Ranch is dangerous to cyclists

Other

- What idiot approved the “development” of Pleasant Valley in a drainage area in the first place? Now that it's here, defend it
- With limited funding, safety is first, not self-serving aesthetics
- Doing nothing not an option?

- Are there really options?
- I disagree with the man who said tourism was a low priority, and agree with Susan Davies that a more “whole community”- based concern be used
- Local PR and education with the general public so that Pleasant Valley doesn't get a bad stigma
