James G. Colvin II

James G. Colvin II ("Jim") was born in New York City, graduated from Hamilton College in 1964 where he was President of his fraternity, Delta Kappa Epsilon, and was Captain of the football team. Jim served in the Navy during the Vietnam War and commanded his own swift boat for three tours. After his active service, he continued in the Navy Reserve, retiring in 1993 at the rank of Captain.

Jim earned his law degree from the University of Denver in 1971 and began his legal career in the City Attorney's Office for the City of Colorado Springs. He was promoted by City Council to the position of City Attorney in 1981. Jim served as the City Attorney until his retirement in 1998. Jim loved the law and loved being an attorney to serve the public interest.

Jim had formidable legal and pragmatic skills. He worked with both elected officials and City administration to ensure that the City's goals were achieved. Among those legal achievements were the annexation of the Broadmoor and the Banning Lewis Ranch. In addition, the development of the current Colorado Springs Airport and the construction of the Robert M. Isaac Municipal Court Building and the Garden of the Gods Visitor Center are a testament to his legal skills dedicated to the betterment of the City. During his tenure, the citizens passed the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights and the Trails, Open Space and Parks special tax. Jim ensured proper implementation of these and other citizen-approved election measures. Jim met with administration and staff, guiding them in land use matters, encouraging parkland development and handling all other legal matters including defense to various lawsuits. Jim was heavily involved in the Colorado Municipal League and its services to cities throughout Colorado. Jim mentored his fine staff of attorneys and ensured that the City continued to provide its valuable services to the community.

Following his retirement from the City, Jim became a consultant and an instructor in political science at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. He also served on numerous boards with particular fondness for the Cheyenne Village, the Cheyenne Mountain Zoo and the Association of Retarded Citizens (ARC). Jim hiked many of Colorado's fourteeners and remained deeply committed to the City's many parks, the jewels of this community.

Jim is survived by his loving and devoted wife, Carolyn, his children Michael and Elizabeth and their families, his step children Jeff and Bob and their families, and his siblings Donald, John and Jocelyn and their families.

THE INTEGRATED WATER RESOURCE PLAN (IWRP) Fact Sheet #2




As stewards of the environment and our expansive water system, it is Colorado Springs Utilities' responsibility to consider all impacts to water supply and distribution and plan accordingly for the future. Water resource planning utilizes a total ecosystem approach to water management. We've had times of drought and strains on our system such as fires and floods, while increasing populations place greater demands on our water resources and its multitude of uses including agriculture, recreation, industrial, domestic and others. We will have some difficult decisions to make around water conveyance, storage, treatment, supply, conservation and policies, and are currently updating our Integrated Water Resources Plan (IWRP).

Recommendations from the 1996 IWRP strategic plan have been implemented including achieving conservation measures, increasing non-potable water development, numerous existing system improvements, and we are nearing completion on Phase I of the Southern Delivery System. In 2014, Springs Utilities began updating the IWRP using comprehensive technical and public processes to shape the 35-50 year planning horizon to ensure the continued clean, safe and reliable water service for our customers.

Technical Process

In past water resources planning efforts, our goal was to find the optimal solution to address the most likely potential future for supply and demand. Our current approach is to find a set of robust solutions that address the broadest range of potential futures so we preserve flexibility to respond to uncertain future conditions. The IWRP is employing scientific modeling to assess baseline conditions, quantify the impacts of risks, and evaluate the benefits of multiple solutions.

We identified and ranked factors that could have the greatest potential to impact current or future water conditions when considering both likelihood and consequence. Additionally we have developed in-depth issues papers exploring each of these factors that can be found on the IWRP website link at end of this document.


